Fall Triennial Weekend to Feature Cromwell, Wethersfield, Farmington, and Lecture on Interactions of Settler and Wangunk peoples

This fall's October 17-19 gathering will be our society's 10th in-person meeting. Each triennial weekend has had a unique emphasis with some familiar repetition. We encourage all members to consider coming to Middletown to reconnect with friends. make new ones, and learn about the area in which some of your ancestors lived. For those arriving Wednesday afternoon, there will be an informal kickoff dinner at 6 PM that evening.

Everyone interested in this area's history is welcome to attend, especially your family members, relatives, and friends. Do you know any prospective members who would enjoy coming? Please register early to assist us in our planning, although we can accommodate last-minute registrations. Note that to receive our group rate at the Residence Inn Hartford-Rocky Hill you must make your reservation by September 6, 2024.

Here is a summary of the activities planned.

Middletown Main Street

Following tradition, our first activity will be to visit Riverside Cemetery near Middletown's Main Street, where many of our ancestors were buried. Sadly, when the railroad came through next to the river, it displaced a number of these burials.

A visit to the Middlesex Historical Society will give us a special opportunity to peruse documents pertaining to many of Middletown's early settlers. First-time attendees can become acquainted with the Godfrey Memorial Library during a break before we convene the family cluster gatherings. These gatherings will start at the library and continue over lunch at a Main Street restaurant of the group's choos-

There will be plenty of time for us to become better acquainted as we share dinners together Wednesday through Saturday. We always look forward to dining at the Saybrook Fish House. This year's farewell dinner will be held Saturday evening at Casa Mia on the Green, an Italian restaurant in Rocky Hill.

Architectural Walking Tour of Early Cromwell

Learn about early Connecticut domestic architecture on this walking tour of the earliest settlement of Middletown's "Upper Houses," now the town of Cromwell, Conn. Although the earthfast homes of the earliest 1650s settlers are long gone, a cluster of houses built between 1720 and 1800 --- and lived in by early Middletown families --- is concentrated within an easily walkable area near the Connecticut River. These houses exhibit not only the characteristics of colonial-era Connecticut architecture, but also the evidence of adaptation and survival through more than two centuries. Your guide is Reg Bacon, a museum/history professional, author, and presenter with specialties in early New England architecture and domestic life.

Cromwell Historical Society Mu-

We will visit the historic Stevens-Frisbee house which serves also as the home of the Cromwell Historical Society and a museum of various artifacts from the Cromwell area. Cromwell was originally part of Middletown with many First Settlers having land there. Before 1851 when Cromwell incorporated as its own town, it was also known as Middletown Upper Houses and as "The Northern Society."

Alternative: Cromwell Old Burying Grounds

For those less interested in the Cromwell Museum, attendees may tour this old cemetery with the remains of many First Settler descendants.

Keynote Presentation

"The Indigenous Wangunks and Middletown's 'First Settlers'," presented by Timothy Ives, Ph.D. In the late 19th century, New England's local historians commonly erased indigenous peoples from the historical narrative. Fortunately for people of today interested in the early history of Middletown, there is historical archaeologist and ethnohistorian Timothy Ives, who has devoted more than two decades to the study and analysis of Wangunk and settler relations in the 17th and 18th centuries. Timothy Ives is currently the senior archaeologist with a private research firm, after a long tenure as Principal Archaeologist for the Rhode Island Historical Preservation and Heritage Commission. Among his articles and publications through the years is one of particular interest to Middletown descendants, his master's thesis entitled Wangunk Ethnohistory: A Case Study of a Connecticut River Indian Community (College of William and Mary, 2001).

Stanley-Whitman Historic House **Tour in Farmington**

Tour of a classic salt-box style home built in the 1720s. According to their website, "The Post Medieval-style house is a rare surviving example of early New England architecture, reminiscent of houses the early Colonists had known in England."

Wethersfield Visit

Wethersfield claims to have been the first European settlement in CT. It was founded as a town in 1634, whereas Windsor at that time was just a trader's outpost. We will visit the 17th-century Cove Warehouse, the center of the community's maritime trade which continued until 1830. We will also venture through the cemetery, again with a local men-
